Perrotis College faculty and administration are committed to keeping these bridges strong to lead the way for students on both sides of the Atlantic

The AFS Class of 2023 witnessed the bridging of faith and science through the presence of His All-Holiness Ecumenical Patriarch Bartholomew at the Commencement Ceremony. During the ceremony, the Patriarch was appointed an Honorary Professor of Environmental Science at Perrotis College in recognition of his work on climate change. #### His All-Holiness Ecumenical Patriarch Bartholomew Addresses Keynote Speech at AFS Graduation

The AFS High School Commencement Ceremony was celebrated on June 22 in the presence of his All-Holiness Ecumenical Patriarch Bartholomew; an exciting and spiritual experience for everyone on campus. In his speech, the Patriarch spoke of the importance of environmental education in addressing climate change and protecting the planet for future generations. He praised the School's holistic educational programs, its multi-dimensional curricula and the combination of scientific knowledge, research and practical emphasis, and expressed his certainty that our graduates will be ecology pioneers.







In his remarks, President Lansdale said: "His All-Holiness Ecumenical Patriarch Bartholomew has united people around the world not just through faith, but also through his commitment towards the protection of the environment. He has managed to connect religion and science in a time where younger generations needed it the most. He has helped raise awareness of what institutions and individuals can do to address climate change. This is what we teach our students at the American Farm School; how to connect their soul with the soil, how to be proactive, and how to be ready to own success. #### Perrotis College Accredited by NECHE

Perrotis College was granted initial accreditation by the New England Commission of Higher Education (NECHE), validating the Institution's hard work and reaffirming what we all appreciate about Perrotis College: its uniqueness, relevance and quality.

The Commission congratulated Perrotis College on demonstrating compliance with the Standards for Accreditation well within the five-year candidacy period. Having partnered with Cardiff University (UK) since 2007, the College has a well-established track record of delivering high quality academic programs in support of its mission "to deliver the best possible holistic agricultural and environmental science education while becoming an inspiring learning and research center in the wider region."



While Perrotis will continue to offer its degree programs in

Sustainable Agriculture and Management, Food Science and Technology, International Business, Environmental Science, and Digital Marketing Management in the three-year format required by the Greek government, to meet NECHE's standards, the College "reassessed and appropriately redesigned" its curriculum to include a minimum 40-credit General Education component that reflects the Institution's dedication to the American-style liberal arts model and "encourages students to realize their intellectual and cultural potential, grow professionally, and develop as responsible citizens."

Perrotis offers an array of academic and student support services that, combined with the extraordinary commitment of the College's dynamic faculty and staff to the Institution and to its students, contribute to laudable student success rates (e.g., 80% of Perrotis graduates are employed or pursuing advanced degrees within 18 months of graduation).



The Commission shares the Institution's confidence that with the support of its competent leadership, dedicated faculty and staff, and enthusiastic students, Perrotis will continue to "provide degree programs that are both research-based and practically oriented, and which respond to the public's social, economic, and environmental concerns ... to students from rural and urban Greece, Southeastern Europe, the European Union, the United States, and worldwide."

#### Perrotis College Expands its Study Abroad Program

Promoting interuniversity collaboration, Perrotis College welcomed more than 70 students from various U.S. universities College to learn more on food production in the region. through its study abroad program. Students receive academic credits for their assignments, which are then transferred to 
Thanks to NECHE Accreditation, the College now offers more their universities. All projects are designed and supervised by the Perrotis College professors, aiming to explore practical aspects for each specialty while maximizing the students' academic experience.

In their testimonials, the students say that they chose Perrotis College to expand their learning opportunities, to experience the agro-food sector in Greece, and to combine theory and action, within an international context. They were impressed by the Perrotis College and the AFS campus facilities. During the event, the two organizations highlighted examples that focus on the importance of mobilizing youth leadership in water management, preservation and sustainability efforts. The audience was engaging through creative and interactive participatory virtual tools. Dr. Lansdale elaborated on the challenges that the future represents in terms of global water management, pointing out the important aspect of the exponential population growth.

Dr. George Fytianos, former chair of the B.Sc. program in Environmental Science at Perrotis College presented the environment-related courses as well as the actions and initiatives undertaken by the School towards environmental protection. The joint action brought together citizens of the world through an innovative approach on water management. This was the first The American Farm School could not miss global discussions on time – after four decades – that the United Nations hosted a conference on water.

## Haseotes Middle School Students Win First Place at the European Statistics Competition

The Haseotes Middle School came out on top at the European Statistics Competition, organized by Eurostat. Ninth graders Polykarpos-Aris Kalaitzidis, Dimitrios Paroutis and Maria-Anastassia Trevla, were awarded first place among 1,444 schools, 5,208 teams and 19,388 students from 19 countries in Europe! This is the first time a Greek team receives the first award at a Eurostat competition.

The team qualified to the European competition by securing second place at the National Statistics Competition 2023, organized by ELSTAT, the Greek National Statistics Service. They won first place for their 2-minute video on ...prosperity.

Noah Kourtsidis, whose brother also studies in the U.S., will be studying International Relations at Lehigh University. Odysseus Koutrolikos got accepted to Davidson College and Stavros Poggas to WPI. Thanassis Rakopoulos got accepted to Franklin & Marshall College where he will study Molecular Biology. "The level of the classes offered at AFS was exceptionally high and equipped us with all necessary skills and qualifications to tackle the demanding U.S. academic world" he shared.

In the past 11 years, close to 90 students, both from the General and Vocational High School, have secured a scholarship to study at U.S. universities through the Study USA program. All students benefited from the School's Scholarship Program, supported by donors in the Unites States and Greece.



In it, they detail the life of "Yanni", a young man striving to survive in Greece in 2023, faced with the aftermath of the long financial crisis. While watching the story, the audience is barraged with statistics and tables, confirming what they see on screen.

The three students take pride in their success: "We worked hard and we worked systematically. This is the third year we are participating. Statistics is an extremely interesting science, a truly appealing one". Together with their math teacher Olga Grigoriadou, the students attended the award ceremony in Luxembourg in late June.



#### **AFS Welcomes Founder's Descendants**

History and family ties were strengthened in July when AFS Founder's descendants visited campus. Dr. John Henry House's great-great-grandson Dr. John C. House III with his wife Cynthia and their son John S. House with his wife Eva spent a week at the School, touring the facilities, seeing the new developments and meeting with AFS and Perrotis College faculty. Everyone's excitement was evident as the family experienced how much Dr. House's vision and hard work have accomplished. During their stay they visited the historical archives, the memorial park and paid tribute to the new bust of Mother House.



#### Farm Revitalization Initiative: The Beekeeping Center

On June 21, the American Farm School celebrated the inauguration of its new Beekeeping Center in the presence of AFS Trustees and donors Attiki Bee Culturing Company Alex Pittas and USDA-ARS. Professor Emeritus of the Agricultural University of Athens and AFS Alumnus Dr. Paschalis Harizanis (Class of 1969), whose contribution in this effort has been crucial from the very beginning, introduced the Center, including honey harvesting by some Trustees.

The Center's objective is to provide training in bees, from their biological cycle to their role in the sustainability of life and their high value products. AFS students of all ages as well as visitors will become acquainted with aspects of beekeeping, both on a theoretical and on a practical level. The Beekeeping Center currently hosts 15 beehives and is surrounded by a bee-friendly garden within a radius of several meters, which includes specimens from bee-attracting flora found in Greek rural areas (trees, bushes and herbaceous plants).



Mr. Giorgos Pittas, Ms. Alexandra Chazapi-Pitta and Mr. Panagiotis Pittas, representatives of Attiki Bee Culturing Company expressed their satisfaction for the result. "The Beekeping Center has the capacity to train up to 25 people each time and it includes main and auxiliary facilities. The main facilities, include a 30-meter-long hangar which hosts about 15 beehives, a 15-meter-long hangar with workbenches for the trainees as well as a 5-meter-long hangar with information on all aspects of beekeeping. Next to the hangar, there will be a storage room to keep all training material and equipment. The remaining space will accommodate well-known bee-friendly plants from all around Greece, arranged in a way that provides information on each plant. The second space includes a hangar and an apiary with more beehives destined for workshops on more specialized beekeeping operations, like raising queen bees and producing beehive products, or fighting against enemies and diseases affecting honeybees. This second space forms an integral part of the training process", commented Dr. Harizanis.

"The establishment of the AFS Beekeeping Center will expand the potential of applied research in the field of entomology but it will also create new training opportunities for students, attracting new talents in the field of agricultural research. Our workshops are connected to knowledge, innovation and the training of the next generation of researchers. This is the reason we are grateful that we remain active on the AFS campus, a unique and ideal context to further develop applied agricultural research", said Dr. Alexandra Chaskopoulou, head of USDA -ARS located at Perrotis College.

#### Literature Supports AFS

Trustees, AFS graduates and friends attended Katherine Kaye's "Sailing with the Wind of Freedom: Lascarina Bouboulis and the War for Greek Independence" book presentation at the New York Society Library in early May. A percentage of the proceeds from the sale of the book go to the American Farm School.

Kaye's interest in the life of Lascarina Bouboulis, the legendary heroine of the Greek War for Independence, began when she visited the Greek island of Spetses in 1984. From this island in the Saronic Gulf. Bouboulis, who became known to history as Bouboulina, helped launch the Revolution of 1821 that would free part of Greece from Ottoman Turkish rule. Kaye has taken care to write about complex themes—including the importance of national unity and self-determination, the cascade of horrors unleashed by ethnic hatred. and the limited options open to women for most of recorded history—in a way that makes them understandable to young readers. While the book was written for children and teenagers ages 12 to 18, it will also appeal to people of any age who are interested in the history of modern Greece, the Ottoman Empire, and the usually unrecognized role of women in determining their country's destiny.



Trustee and Co-Chair of the Development Committee Joannie Danielides shared information about the School following the book presentation. Among the audience was Evgenia Oikonomou Doska, who graduated AFS in 1953 with 19 other girls thanks to the Marshall Plan! We thank Ms. Kaye for her support and for bringing us back together with members of the extended AFS community.


As the students packed their bags to leave, they were not only taking their belongings with them, but also memories of a place and a people that fundamentally changed their perspective for
